# "Relief" and "Mountains": Primary School Teachers Confronted with Discursive and Visual Framing of Salience

M., is going to point to the middle ground... it is not so clear but it was misty on that day. You can take the ruler; it'll be easier this way. Yes, just like this. It will be easier. Stand aside because when you are showing something and you are standing in front of it you are also hiding it.

The pupil points to the middle ground with the ruler.
Correct, so, this middle ground, what is it?
It's the valley.
What is the valley?
It's like a mountain but it's a little flatter at the bottom...
Is a valley flat? It depends...
No, it's hollow...
(Aside, to me: you see all the vocabulary they need to revise....)
Right, a valley, what is it linked with?
With mountains.
It is linked with mountains... Oh , we'll revise this, well...
It is between two mountains. In fact, it's a mountain that is like this (the pupil waves her hand in the air in an up and down movement) and towards the end it's like this (the pupil draws the profile of a basin with her hand).

OK, but what I want to do is to define a mountain?
Eerr...well a mountain is...
What's a mountain? I have no idea...
No hands up.
What mountain is it, first?
(Aside, to me: because they are confused about mountains, mountain massifs, summits, mounts... rather tricky, hey)

So, here, can you see all the Pyrenees?
No (everyone)
So you see a part of the Pyrenees, a part of the mountain massif of the Pyrenees. Now, M., please flip he map over (the pupils must flip the mural map over to show the side representing relief) and you show us the Pyrenees on the map. Turn it over, turn it over...careful...Show us where the Pyrenees are? (...)

Then the teacher asks a number of questions and pupils answer about the localisation of the Eastern Pyrenees, of the city of Perpignan.

So, let's get back to the photo. Here, you're telling me, you see mountains. So in fact, you don't see mountains, you see summits. There are many, many, many. What's this called? What you call the mountains? What is it a part of? Now, come here, E., and
you'll show us the foreground. With the ruler. Follow the whole foreground. As if you were drawing the contour.

The teacher takes a large sheet of white paper and then says: "Now, we're going to do something". She puts the sheet of paper up on the board with the help of the pupils, over the photo projected on the board. After a few minutes, the paper is taped on the board.

So, E., what you did with the ruler, you're now going to do the same with the pen for me.

The pupil goes and takes the pen, he starts drawing.
So let's go, quick, quick. M., I'd like you to come and draw the same as you did earlier. Go on, go on, it doesn't need to be that minute. Yes,... careful, careful... (the pupil draws quickly). Good.

Someone wants to come and draw the background?
Another pupils comes forward and draws the background.
Step down from the bench, give me my pen back... right, we could go on but the photo is truncated.

So, what have we drawn here, what is it called?
Great enthusiasm on the part of the pupils who all raise their hand to give the answer
A sketch.
The teacher's face reveals disappointment and surprise. She had not expected such an answer.

No, what did we draw in black?
The foreground, middle ground and background.
OK, yes but what do they represent? If we only look at the three parts. Look, I stop, I hide the picture, that there. What can you see?

The sketch
The contours
But what in fact are these contours? What are they the contours of? What are they called? (pointing to the lines with the ruler).

The contours of the background.
Right, (perceptible annoyance in her voice) you told me earlier that they are mountains, this is the valley. What is all of this part of?

Of the mountain landscape.
I think I am going to give up. Mountains, plains, valleys, what are they all together? We have been studying this since the beginning of the term.

The landscape
That's not all there is in a landscape. Forget about the lines, what do you see? What can you say about these lines when you see them? It's a landscape of...

Mountains
Yes, so what are the mountains? They are the... the...
No answer
It's like the map up there... this map over there, it is a map of... Just read...
Relief... relief... (several pupils find the expected word).
So what we see here in black is the... what we see in black are the lines of... ?
Relief
Yes, the relief.
