Abstract

This visual essay, “Cannibalism City”, depicts an imaginary city under the attack of Covid-19 in different perspectives. Since January 2020, many cities have been locked down due to the pandemic. 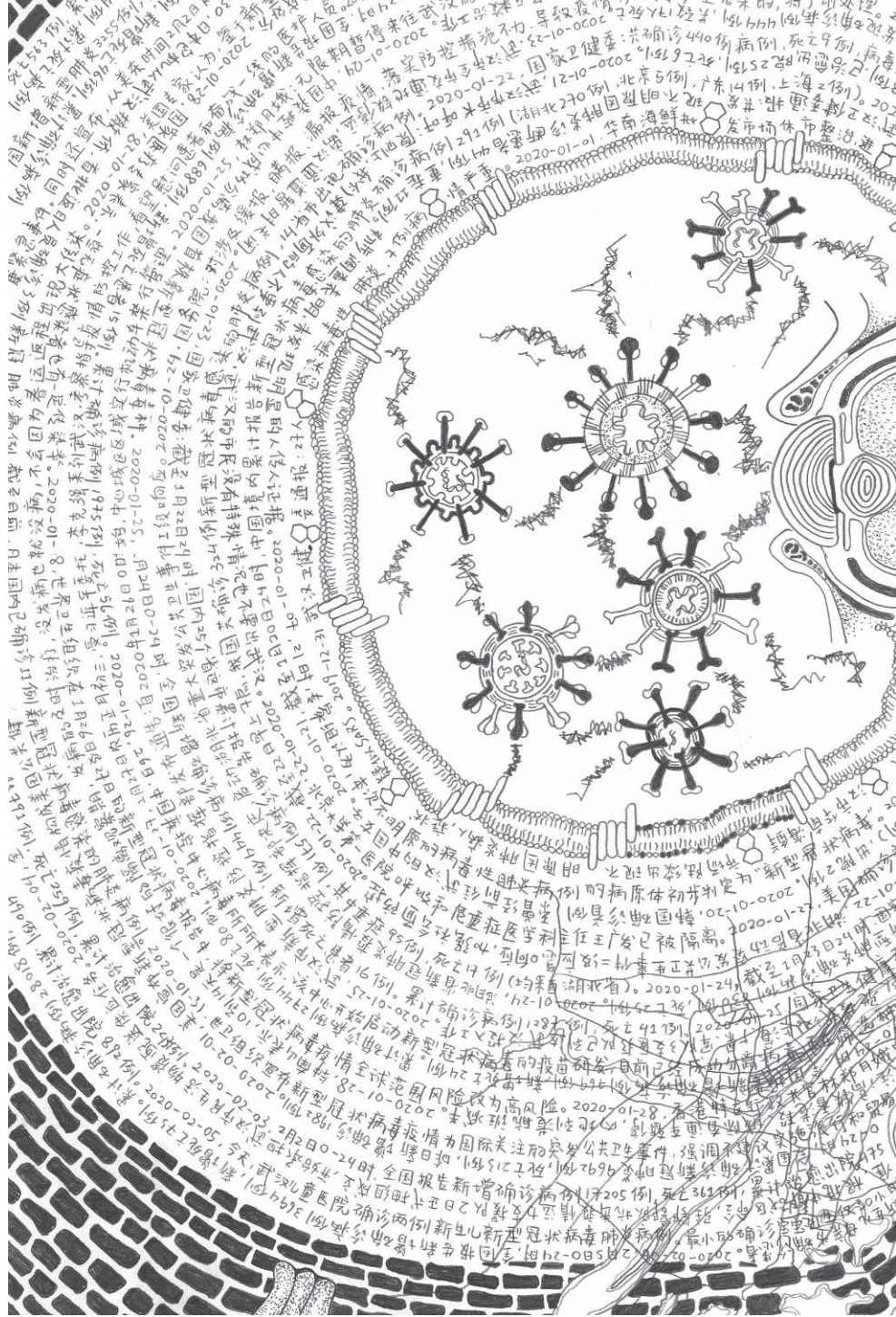

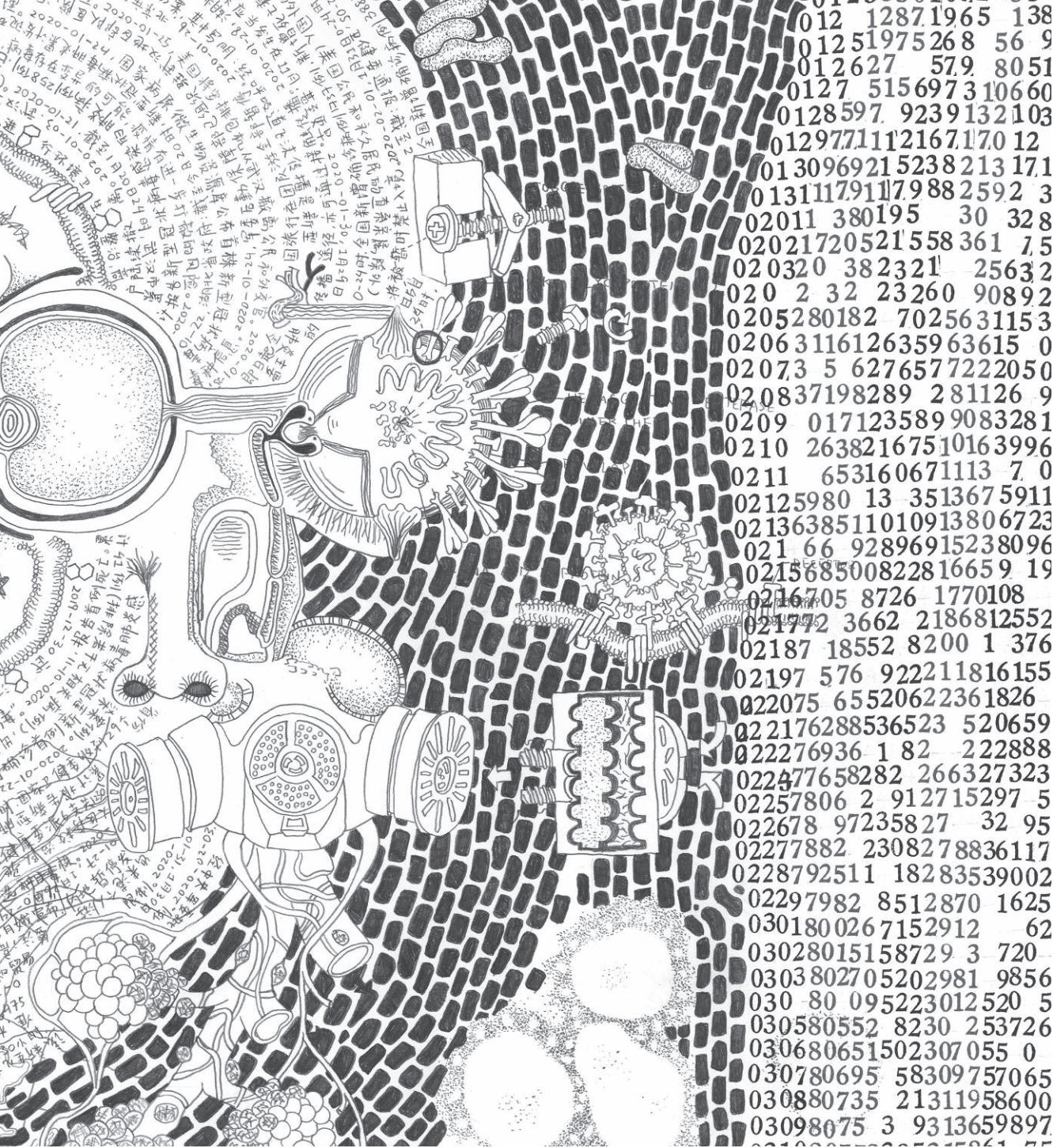

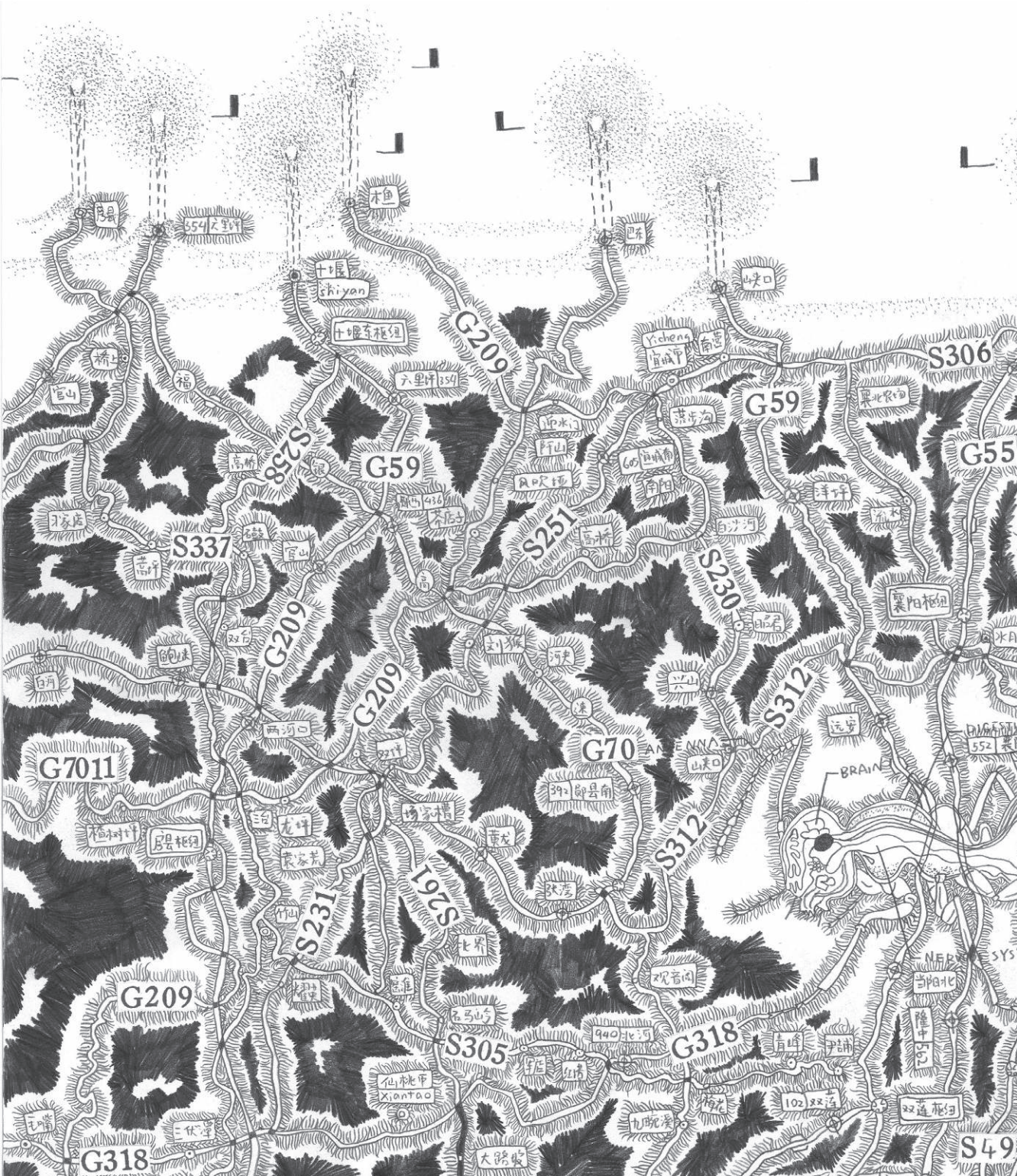
Media Fortress

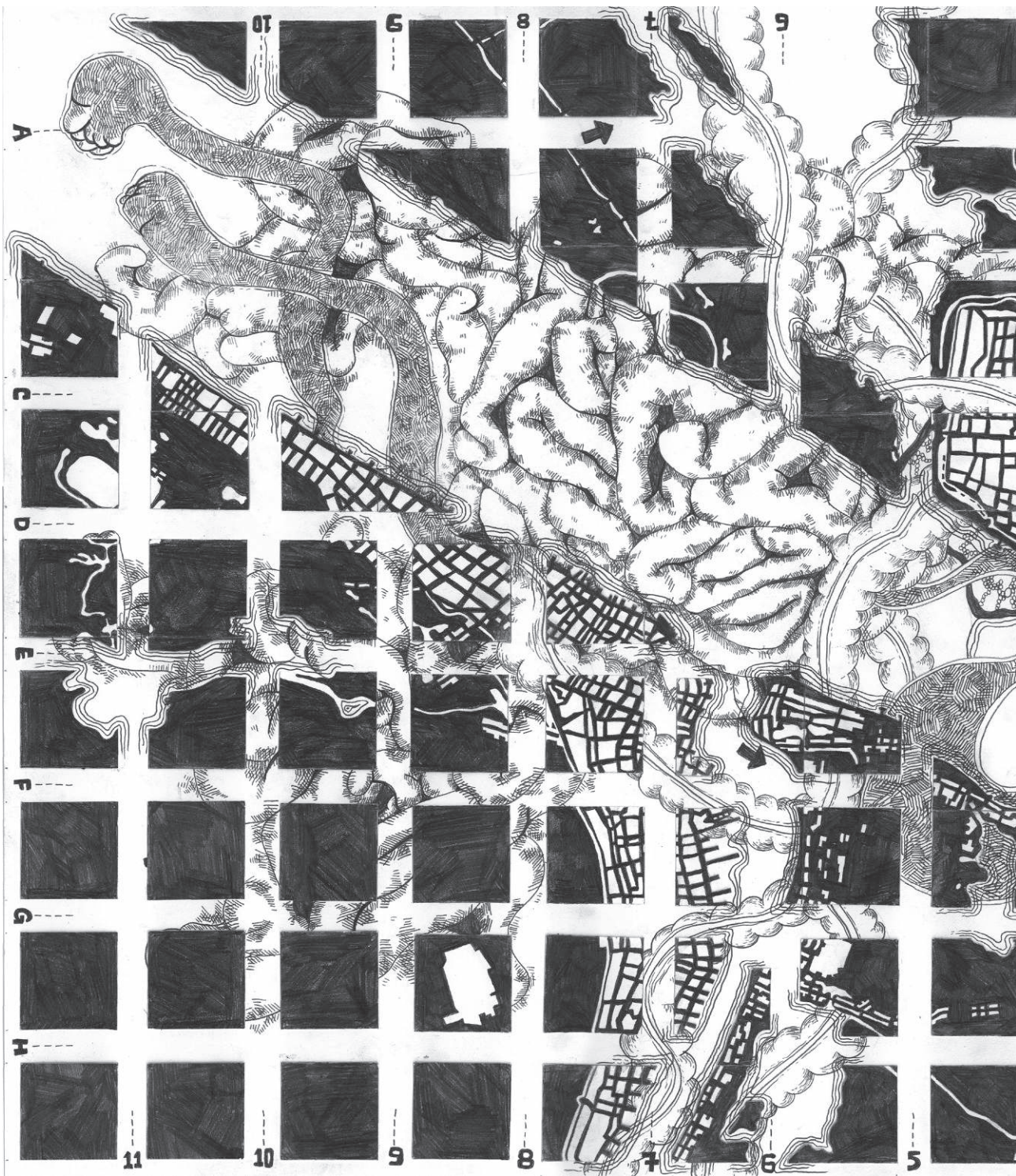

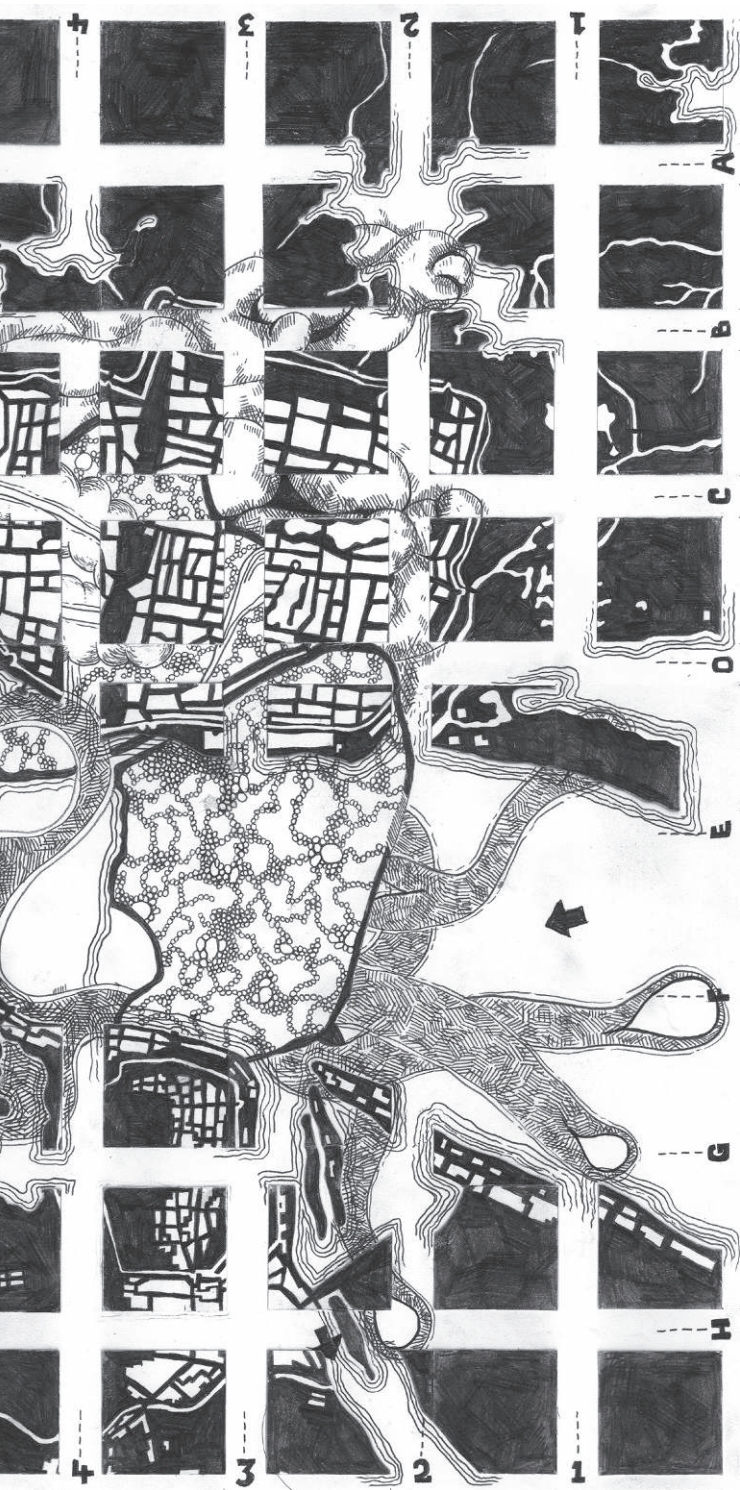




Social Intestine

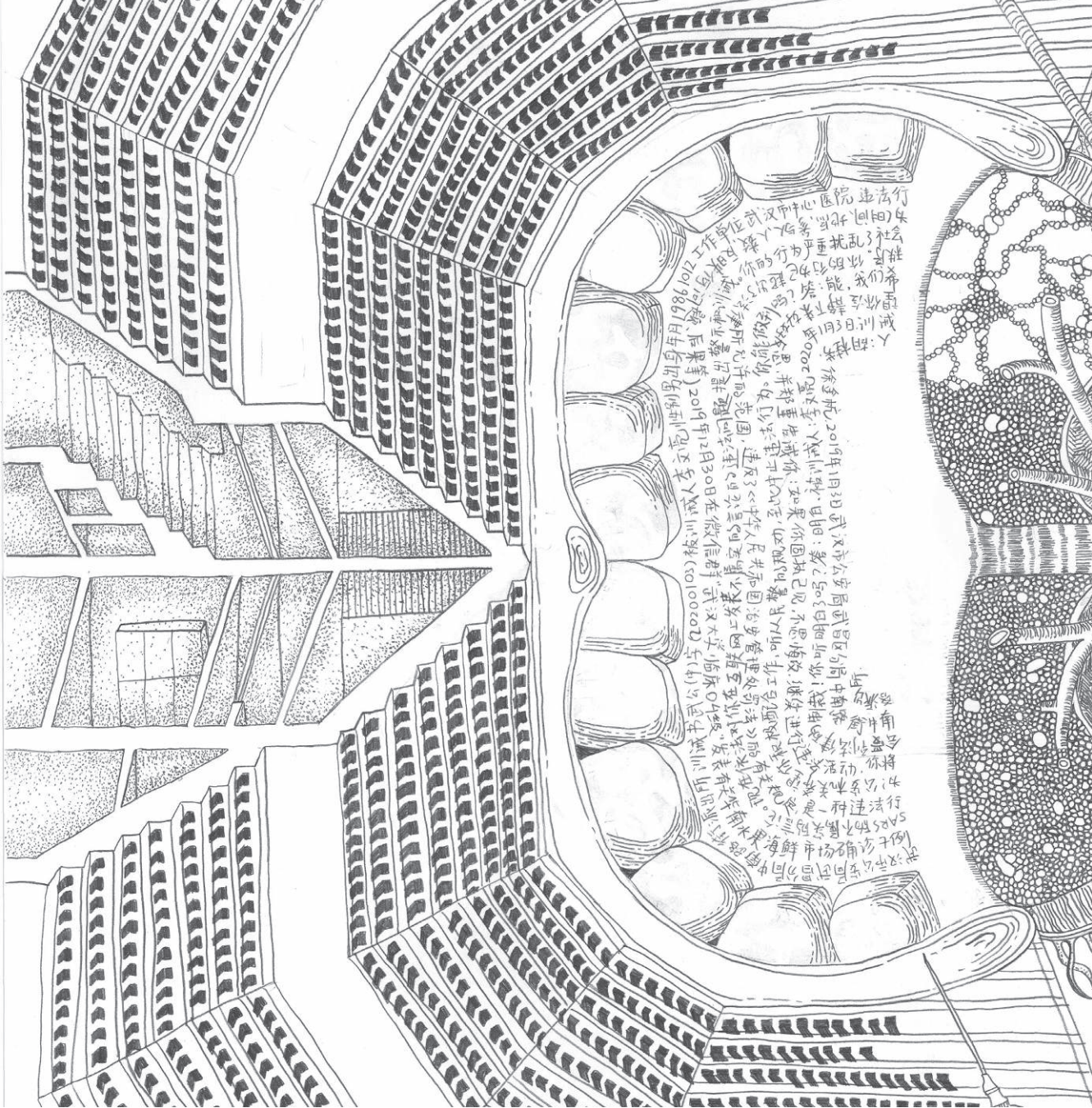


Fig. 4- Cannibalism City. The text in the middle is about Dr. Li Wenliang, one of the Covid-19 whistleblowers, who died from the disease on 7 February 2020 at age of 33.

Cannibalism City

Cannibalism City, it reminds me of a paragraph in *A Madman's Diary* by Lu Xun:

In ancient times, as I recollect, people often ate human beings, but I am rather hazy about it. I tried to look this up, but my history has no chronology, and scrawled all over each page are the words: "Virtue and Morality." Since I could not sleep anyway, I read intently half the night, until I began to see words between the lines, the whole book being filled with the two words, "Eat People." (Lu, 1960)



Who is eating? Is it the city? Who is in that city? Is it us? We are spectators standing in the Colosseum, watching the city open its giant bloody mouth and eat people, applauding, eventually falling into the mouth. "Perhaps there are still children who have not eaten men? Save the children..." (Lu, 1960).
